*** SAINT AUGUSTINE TRIDUUM**

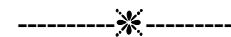
In your bulletin today, you will find a folder that has the prayers for the **ST. AUGUSTINE TRIDUUM**. Three days of prayer prior to the Feast of St. Augustine. This is a laudable old custom. We encourage you to honour our patron by praying these prayers on the three days prior to his feast on Saturday. So begin on Friday and say them on the 26th, 27th, and 28th of August.

Think About It: Whatever we do without prayer and without hope in God turns out afterwards to be harmful and defective. *St. Mark the Ascetic* (5th century)
