JESUS respected the sacredness of the Old Law and submitted to its ceremony of circumcision. The rite officially incorporated Him into the Jewish religion and was a figure of Baptism. The Saviour came to fulfill and to replace the Old Law, and to incorporate people of all nations into His Mystical Body through Baptism. From Him, the Head, we receive all of the graces needed to live worthily as His members. We become “acceptable” to God in the measure that we are cleansed from sin, reborn, give God His due worship and obedience, and render to our fellow man on earth both justice and Christ-like charity.
